# THE BEST HRISTMAS

"This will be the best Christmas ever—it's the first one I can remember being clean and sober. I want this so bad. I know what women out there are feeling. They are stuck, waiting for a place to get help. Well, now I know, you don't have to be stuck."

Mary Kay is excited about her newfound freedom from addiction. accomplished through the help of The Foundry Rescue Mission and Recovery Center, gifts from friends like you and the transformational power of God. So many things in her life have changed.

As a teen, Mary Kay started experimenting with alcohol and marijuana. When she was 23, her mother died. Six months later, her father passed away. Her casual

drug use became an everyday occurrence, and she added prescription nerve pills to the deadly mix. Life spun out of control. Within another half year, she was divorced. "I thought the pain would last forever," Mary Kay says. "The comfort I needed, I found in drugs."

A second marriage to an abusive man—and the birth of another daughter—didn't change things for her. When that relationship broke up, Mary Kay found her comfort in cocaine. That's when Mary Kay reached the bottom and cried out to God, "Please, just do something. I can't hold on much longer. Just let me die."

The maintenance man at her apartment complex knew a graduate of our program. Together, they helped Mary Kay come to The Foundry. "I went to church as a child, and I accepted Christ as my Savior when I was a teen. But, I never understood what it meant to let Him be Lord of my life until I came here," Mary Kay says.

In addition to helping Mary Kay overcome her drug and alcohol abuse, we gave her the encouragement and support she needed to complete vocational rehabilitation—and she's ready to start a new job. The changes in Mary Kay's attitude and selfconfidence have had a positive impact on her relationship with her daughters, as well. "I've never experienced love the way I have the past couple of months. Now I can love my girls with the love I am given by God. I'm not the same mommy that I was."

Mary Kay is looking forward to Christmas with her family, and she believes she has already received the greatest gift of all. "When you are sick and tired of what you are faced with, you don't have to live like that anymore. We are loved beyond our imagination. I'm finally comfortable looking at myself in the mirror."

Thank you for allowing The Foundry to be a place where God can reach people like Mary Kay and give them a second chance.

#### INVEST IN A LIFE

As one-on-one mentors, our life coaches work directly with men on the road to recovery to help bring stability and purpose to their lives. The relationship can be especially important during the holidays, when men are away from their families and often feel forgotten and alone. And according to Life Coach Jay Henson, "You'll get as much out of being a life coach as does the resident!"

Having overcome addiction issues of his own, Jay says in working, mentoring and sharing with an individual the issues he has already faced, he benefits just as much as the resident he is coaching. (Being a life coach is not limited to those who have battled addiction, however. Fewer than 65 percent of our current life coaches have experienced it personally.) Jay also believes when communication and the process is done correctly, the joy he receives when residents call him for advice is truly the biggest blessing.
